Eligible beneficiaries must have a dementia diagnosis, be enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B, and not reside in skilled long-term care or certain other programs.

Community-based palliative care programs are well-suited to execute the GUIDE Model due to their patient-centered approach and existing relationships with hospices and facilities. Steps to participate include conducting a needs assessment, meeting with providers, securing contracts, educating teams, and raising community awareness.
